

In Memory of James-John Avery

On January 3, 2001, senior Writing/Literature major J.J. Avery was killed in a car accident when his vehicle lost control on the icy roads near Eugene, Ore. His fellow students and professors mourned his death and celebrated his life at a campus-wide memorial service, blessing the George Fox community through memories shared in tribute to a much-loved classmate, student, and friend. At the April 28th graduation ceremony, his parents were awarded an honorary B.A. degree on J.J.'s behalf. We dedicate this yearbook to the memory of J.J. Avery. We miss you.









Women's Soccer

Highlights of the year led to one of the finest seasons in the ten-year history of George Fox women's soccer.

Season to Remember ith the loss of a very talented assistant coach, Byron Shenk took over as head coach - the first that the women's team has ever had. Two new assistants, Heather Thibodeau and Todd Williams, plus several skilled freshmen, added strength to an already talented team. The Bruins opened the season by winning the Western Baptist Courthouse Athletic Club Classic and were 2-2 entering conference play. One highlight of the season was an at-home upset over Willamette University that ended the Bearcats' 62 game winning streak. The Bruins finished third in the

conference with an 11-3 mark. With a 13-5 overall record, they had hopes of being invited to the NCAA National Championships, but were disappointed when not selected for the five-team West Regionals. Even so, the Bruins posted the secondbest record in team history.

Volleyball

Steve Grant, the Bruins' head coach for 19 years, endured only his second losing season, but still has an impressive record, ranking in the top 15 among active coaches in the NCAA Division III for career wins.

the 1999 team, the 2000 George Fox volleyball team figured to be short on experience. That forecast proved true as the Bruins struggled to a 7-15 record, snapping a streak of 13 winning seasons and marking only the fourth losing campaign in the 22 years of Bruin volleyball.

There were some impressive moments for the young George Fox team, however. The Lady Bruins opened the season with a 2-2 record in the Pikes Peak Challenge, including an upset win over national power Colorado College. In the Bruins' first home match, they lost a 3-2 heartbreaker to La Verne, who went on to become one of only two teams in the country to endure the regular season undefeated. The Bruins also defeated a Whitman team among the best in the Northwest Conference en route to a 5-11 conference record and a seventh place finish

pening with a record setting 9-0 start, the 2000-01 Lady Bruins picked up where they left off last season in rewriting the record books. The Bruins staked this season as their most succesful ever by compiling a 23-3 overall record, clinching the NW Conference title with a 15-1 record, and hosting a 2nd round national tournament game.

Ranked No. 11 nationally in the official d3hoops.com pre-season poll, the Bruins climbed the ladder to the eventual No. 1 spot, earning enough votes to knock off the three-time defending national champion Washington (Mo.) University. The No. 1 title also came with a large target, as the Bruins experienced a week later when they were upset by Willamette University 59-56. The loss ended a record-tying 11 game winning streak. However, Bruin persistence and two wins to end the regular season clinched the NWC title for the 2nd year in a row; it also allowed the Bruins their first ever opportunity to host a national tournament game.

The Bruins were led by senior center Katie Lacey who repeated as NWC "Player of the Year." Fifth year head coach Scott Rueck repeated his "Coach of the Year" accolades from last year by being named "Co-Coach of the Year" for the 2000-01 season.




