To the People of Vermont:

During 1944 the War Finance Committee for Vermont conducted the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth War Loan Campaigns, all eminently successful;—successful not alone in the amount of money raised but successful in that it enabled more than one hundred thousand Vermonters to save and at the same time furnish their government with funds to conduct the war.

In these three campaigns Vermonters purchased \$112,600,000 worth of Bonds of all kinds; \$20,450,000 in Series E Bonds and \$8,626,000 in Series F and G Bonds, and the remainder in the so-called Treasury issues.

To sell this large amount of Bonds required a good organization and a cooperative response on the part of the people. We had both.

Vermont's sales army in each of the three campaigns consisted of about four thousand men and women. People who gave of their time and effort to make these campaigns a success;—to them, as well as to the people of Vermont, I am very grateful.

As we assemble in town meeting this year with the realization that the management of our political and civic affairs is in our own hands, let us turn our thoughts to those who are fighting to preserve these rights and liberties. Let us resolve that there may be no lessening in our efforts to back them to the limit that the war may be shortened and that their return to their homes may be hastened.



Although we are passing through very trying times in the public schools of this country, due to teacher shortage, Clarendon has experienced very little difficulty in obtaining the services of efficient teachers.

At the beginning of the present school year, Mrs. Gladys Gage was employed to take the place of Mrs. Zella M. Cartland at North Clarendon and she is doing excellent work.

When we stop to realize that approximately 200,000, or 20 per cent of the nation's teachers, have left the profession for war service and other fields of labor, we must be convinced that the teacher supply of the future presents a most serious problem.

This situation must not be ignored but should be given thorough consideration and followed up with actions.

The enrollment in our teacher training institutions has decreased more than 50% in the past few years. This means that building up of the profession through qualified teachers must be greatly encouraged. We believe that when Vermonters are generally aware of the impending danger to education, they will be among the first in the country to correct it.

Teachers' salaries must be more favorable in comparison with those in other fields of labor, if the young people are to be provided with the opportunities of that kind of education which they have a right to expect.

The schools of Clarendon have maintained a very respectable standard for many years and this record is holding true even under the present war conditions. This is the result of efficient teachers and the excellent cooperation of citizens.

The school directors should be commended for the business-like manner in which they have looked after the care of the school property.

There will always be needed repairs, but money can be saved by doing the work on time, and the directors understand this thoroughly.

It will be noticed in another part of this report that the attendance record is very commendable indeed.

I want to give all parties concerned due credit for such substantial cooperation in the interest of the entire student body.
