Groveland's Steve Bird, Combat Medic with the 1st Air Cavalry

Groveland's Steve Bird was conceived by his parents in 1946 at the US Military Academy in West Point, New York. His dad was a US Army Soldier, serving our Nation as an artillery instructor at West Point, teaching future US Army Officers. Steve grew up in Haverhill, Massachusetts, and was a member of Haverhill High's Class of 1965. After


high school, he attended Northern Essex Community College. Drafted by the US Army in November of 1967, he was sent to Fort Dix, New Jersey for Basic Training, then to Fort Sam Houston, Texas for advanced training as an Army Medic. After completing training, Steve was granted nineteen days leave and sent to Vietnam.

Assigned to the 1st Air Cavalry Division, in Headquarters Company of the 2nd Battalion, 8th Cavalry Medical

Platoon. Arriving in Vietnam in April of 1968, he was moved from the Medic Platoon to an Infantry unit two weeks later in May, replacing another Medic, a man named Dempsey Parrot, who was killed in action, just a few days before he was scheduled to meet his wife in Hawaii for R&R. (Rest and Relaxation Leave). The Medic he replaced was respected and admired by the platoon, the soldiers, also noted that "Parrot" was replaced by "Bird" with a sense of irony unique among combat troops.

The 1st Air Cavalry could move the entire division from one area of operations to another, in twenty-four hours or less. During periods on intense combat, the division could be moved to engage the enemy by Army Leadership faster than other units of division size. This mobility kept the unit constantly in contact with the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army, resulting in 5,621 members of the division being killed in action during Vietnam. Ten percent of the Americans on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington DC, served in the 1st Air Cavalry.

General Vo Nguyen Giap was the leader of the North Vietnam military during both the American and French conflicts, he feared the combat readiness and mobility of the 1st Air Cavalry. He noted in his writings the enormous casualties inflicted on his troops by the unit. Many military experts assert that the Division killed 30-40,000 North Vietnamese Troops during the Tet Offensive and follow up operations in I Corp in the Spring and Summer of



1968.

Steve shared his story with me over the phone. The first time he was wounded was in a situation where the movements of the NVA were masked by heavy rain. He was called up to assist a five-man machine gun team that were all wounded, and he was wounded while advancing to their position. A forward observer for Artillery assisted him to cover. At the same time, the North Vietnamese, lobbed a grenade into the machine gun position, killing all five men inside. Despite the heroic efforts of helicopter pilot, twenty-one-year-old Chief Warrant Officer Art Jacobs and his crew, Medevac was impossible.

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Lawrence Turns a Corner While Methuen Flounders

Lawrence Mayor Brian DePena has significantly increased his influence on Beacon Hill with three huge wins on Primary day. DePena took office last November with an overwhelming victory at polls, promising to bring the different factions of the city together to move Lawrence forward.

That happened on Primary day.

DePena endorsed Lawrence City Councilor Pavel Payano for State Senate, Estela Reyes for State Representative, and in a bold move, recruited and endorsed local businessman Francisco Paulino to run for state rep. against a very popular incumbent Marcos Devers.

All three won decisive victories on Election Day, despite the fact that these races had more voters in Methuen and

Haverhill than there are in Lawrence.

“This was about putting together a team at The State House to bring in more funding for the city,” the mayor told The Valley Patriot just minutes after learning that all his candidates had won.

“But also, I say, and I said it over and over, we have to build a partnership with Methuen and Haverhill because we are all in the same boat. We can’t be rowing in different directions. When Methuen improves, it helps us. When we improve it helps the rest of the Valley. Now we have Pavel, Estela, and Francisco, all members of my team at the state house with one message and none of the foolishness we see in the rest of the party. We are giving government back to the people.”

By contrast, all of the local candidates

endorsed by Methuen Mayor Neil Perry lost on election day. This diminishes his influence, and thereby Methuen’s influence on Beacon Hill.

Perry put a lot of time and effort into campaigning for Jim McCarty for state representative after two years of McCarty personally attacking him and questioning his integrity. He also endorsed Methuen Councilor Eunice Zeigler for state senate. Both McCarty and Zeigler lost to Lawrence candidates.

While Methuen has three state rep. districts within its city boundaries, plus the current state senator (Diana DiZoglio) being from Methuen, come January the city will only have one resident representing the city in the legislature with Ryan Hamilton who ran unopposed

for the seat being vacated by Linda Dean Campbell.

That’s a significant loss from just five years ago when Methuen had a state senator, and three state reps. doing the city’s bidding in state government.

State Rep.- Elect Estela Reyes had a slightly different take after her win.

“I know a lot of people in Methuen are going to look at this election and think they have lost representation, but I can assure them I will be there for them as if I lived in Methuen.”

That takes a lot of class. A lot more class than we have seen from most Methuen officials lately.

It is our view that this is why Methuen is losing political influence across the board and floundering as a community.◊

State Funding on the Way for Local Priorities

The Massachusetts Legislature finalized major pieces of legislation before formal sessions ended – including several billion-dollar funding bills that will bring significant funding to the Merrimack Valley. I was proud to secure earmarks in these bills for important projects in the district.

Economic Development & Tax Relief: Most disappointing is that legislative leaders could not produce a final economic development and tax relief bill before formal sessions ended. It would have provided significant investments in the Merrimack Valley and in community hospitals, housing, workforce growth, small businesses, food security, and tax relief for residents. This is a massive let-down for so many families, businesses, and organizations that urgently need this financial support.

Without this bill, many businesses and families will struggle. For example, the funding for community hospitals was critically needed by Lawrence General Hospital to help them stay afloat. Legislative leaders must make this right and find a solution to get this bill across the finish line in the coming months.

Transportation & Infrastructure Funding: The Massachusetts Legislature finalized, and Governor Baker signed, an \$11.3 billion transportation and infrastructure bill. I was proud to secure \$1.2 million in bond funding to install sidewalks along Tyler Street in Methuen, from Route 113 to Westwind Drive. This is a critical project for public safety.

This bill also includes \$400 million for the MBTA to address immediate safety concerns; \$275 million for the East-West passenger rail project that will provide great economic benefits; billions of dollars for road, bridge, and rail improvements, plus \$110 million for road paving; and funding for electric vehicles and more sustainable transit systems. These investments will have a tangible impact on the everyday lives of commuters and residents across the state.

Annual State Budget: The Legislature passed, and Governor Baker signed, a \$52.7 billion annual state budget that takes a responsible fiscal approach – investing in the immediate needs of our workforce and working families, while safeguarding against economic difficulties that may lie ahead.

This budget substantially increases direct aid to cities and towns. Methuen is slated to receive \$56.6 million in Chapter 70 education funding (an

increase of nearly \$8 million over last year) and roughly \$6.3 million in general government aid. Haverhill is slated to receive \$73.9 million in Chapter 70 education funding (an increase of nearly \$9 million over last year) and roughly \$11.4 million in general government aid.

With the support of the Methuen and Haverhill state delegations, I was able to secure funding for the following local initiatives – a great win for our communities!

- \$200,000 for upgrades at Greycourt State Park in Methuen. Greycourt is a true historic gem with unlimited potential for hosting community events, and this funding will help with safety upgrades and expanded parking to increase usage of the park.

- \$50,000 to expand mental health services in Methuen schools. For many years, this earmark has improved Methuen students’ access to high-quality mental health services – establishing Methuen as a statewide model for school mental health.

- \$50,000 for building improvements at Cogswell ArtSpace in Haverhill, including needed electrical upgrades. Cogswell will be an incredible community resource, expanding access to the arts for all. This is a great win for our community!

I was also proud to secure funding for statewide initiatives supporting our students and educators, including:

- \$2,000,000 for civics education, a record funding level that is \$500,000 greater than in previous years! Much of this funding goes directly to school districts to support implementation of the state’s 2018 civics education law that I sponsored. This is a big win for our schools, as this funding is in very high demand!

- \$500,000 for school bridge programs, which help students catch up and transition back into the classroom after an extended absence due to a physical or mental health condition. School bridge programs have proven incredibly effective at improving academic outcomes and reducing drop-out rates.

Other highlights include increased education funding in line with the Student Opportunity Act’s seven-year plan, unprecedented investments in affordable child care services and providers, increased funding for housing assistance programs like RAFT and MRVP, millions of dollars for job training and workforce development, and a sizeable contribution to our “rainy day”

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

WINNERS AND LOSER

On September 6th Massachusetts held their primary elections for state offices. Here are some of the winners and losers.

WINNER - DIANA DIZOGLIO

By far the biggest winner of this September election was Methuen's own State Senator Diana DiZoglio, who staged a come from behind win in the State Auditor's race. The party bosses in Boston poured millions of dollars into her opponent's campaign in an all-out political effort to stop DiZoglio from taking the State Auditor's job. Just a few days before the election DiZoglio was polling 3-5 points behind her rival Chris Dempsey but DiZoglio out-worked and out-performed her opponent with voter outreach. I bet the hacks on Beacon Hill are crapping their pants at the thought of DiZoglio auditing all of their secret nonprofits, side contracts, and state funneled jobs programs. I'm looking forward to breaking some GREAT corruption stories uncovered by our new State Auditor DianaDiZoglio. If anyone can clean up the corruption on Beacon Hill, it's Diana.

LOSER - JIM McCARTY

By far the biggest loser in this year's primary election is Methuen City Councilor Jim McCarty who lost his bid for state rep. to Estela Reyes by more than 400 votes. Going into this race McCarty was thought to be the front runner with heavy hitters like Bill Manzi and Neil Perry behind him as well as portraying himself as the champion against corruption and the guy who "took down Joe Solomon." Near the end of the campaign, however, McCarty sent out a mailing that can only be described as a vicious personal attack, filled with inaccuracies and distortions accusing Reyes of having tax liens on her property, which she doesn't. As predicted, the political hit piece caused a backlash and reminded people of all the underhanded things McCarty does on the city council that cause conflict, turmoil, and hinder progress. For her part Estela Reyes refused to get down in the dirt with "Slippin' Jimmy" McCarty and focused on the needs of the voters. At the end of the day McCarty not only lost this election, but he even lost a precinct in Methuen where he has represented those voters for five years. I'd say that makes Jim McCarty the biggest loser of this election.

behind the scenes for Jim McCarty of Methuen over Lawrence Councilor (his former colleague) Estela Reyes. He also supported my friend Marcos Devers in Lawrence over Francisco Paulino. If you think about it, Kendrys Vasquez has not had a win since the last time he ran for reelection to the city council making him not only a loser this year, but a three-time loser.

NORTH ANDOVER SELECTMAN CHRIS NOBILE

Last month, North Andover Selectman Chris Nobile resigned just days after The Valley Patriot published a front-page story questioning his residency and publishing evidence that he had moved to Ogunquit, Maine while maintaining a false address in town. As someone who voted for Nobile, and has always liked him, it gave me no pleasure to write the story. I did give Nobile a chance to comment on the story, but he ignored several calls and text messages. After he resigned however, Nobile sent me a text criticizing the fact that I live in town but never cover all the great things that go on while I focus only on scandal. I have to say this was disappointing. When I endorsed Nobile a few years ago I asked only one thing in return, keep me abreast of what selectmen are doing and shoot me an email if you think there's something good for me to cover. Instead, Nobile never once contacted me again after he won that election. This was a sad end to what I believe was a respectable performance as a civil servant here in North Andover. Nobile should have just resigned from the board the minute he sold his house and moved out. But it does raise another question. Economic Development Efforts Paying off in Dracut

Have you noticed all the new businesses in Dracut? Month after month, there are ribbon cuttings, grand openings, and new offerings all over town. And it's not by chance.

In the last couple years, there's been a renewed focus on economic development and it's paying off for the town and its residents.

Dracut is home to a wide variety of different businesses and new ones are opening all the time, providing the town with more tax revenue and citizens with more in-town choices. Here's a look at just a few of the businesses that have opened in Dracut recently.

Nutrition Junction is serving up protein shakes, calorie-burning teas, and healthy snacks at 1734 Lakeview Avenue.

Across Tennis Plaza, also at 1734 Lakeview Avenue, Barry's Hot Sauce is being made and bottled.

Speaking of heat, Don Tito's Mexican Grill is spicing things up at 34 Broadway Road.

Likewise, Asado's Firewood Grill, an outdoor restaurant at 1276 Broadway Road, features grilled steak, chicken, and chorizo.

Coco's Café & Catering is doing business at 197 Merrimack Avenue.

Woah Nellie's BBQ & More is fired up at 361 Tyngsborough Road.

Nova Farms, Dracut's fourth recreational marijuana dispensary, is up and running at 1274 Merrimack Avenue.

Downtown Barbell, a new gym with a weight-lifting focus, is pumping up patrons at 15 Victory Lane.

Keller Williams Realty Success has opened a Dracut office at 7 Broadway Road.

Those are just some of the new businesses to open in the last six months or so. Bringing new businesses to town is just one area of focus for the town's Economic Development Committee and Economic Development Project Planner Dan Phelps. Supporting existing businesses is another.

Every month, an existing establishment is named "business of the month" and

highlighted in an article by Phelps on the town's economic development website. Brox Farm has been chosen for September. Other businesses featured this year include Scola's Restaurant, Farmer Dave's, Wignall Animal Hospital, Essex Silver-Line Corporation and Lucky Oil.



Recently, you may have noticed the new signs around town delineating the town's nine business districts: Broadway Road, Bridge Street, Collinsville, Dracut Center, East Dracut, Hovey Square, Kenwood, Lakeview, and Navy Yard. Members of the Economic Development Committee developed the program to give each district its own identity and help encourage local commerce at businesses in all sections of town. On the back of each sign, there's a code you can scan to get more information about the history of the specific district and the town's sign program.

In addition, to support and promote in-town Christmas shopping during the upcoming holiday season, a scavenger hunt and other activities are in the works.

When it comes to economic development, the town's message is loud and clear: Dracut is open for business!

DiZoglio, Local Mayors Rally for Action on Economic Relief

State Senator Diana DiZoglio (D-Methuen) was recently joined by local mayors from across the Merrimack Valley and North Shore in calling on the State Legislature to return to session and resume work on stalled economic development and tax relief legislation.

Joining DiZoglio at a rally in front of Lawrence City Hall were Lawrence Mayor Brian A. De Peña, Lowell Mayor Sokhary Chau, Methuen Mayor Neil Perry, Haverhill Mayor Jim Fiorentini, Amesbury Mayor Cassandra Gove, Newburyport Mayor Sean Reardon, State Representative Marcos A. Devers (D-Lawrence) and Lawrence Director of Health & Human Services Martha Velez.

The event came on the heels of DiZoglio's call on Senate President Karen E. Spilka (D-Ashland) and House Speaker Ronald Mariano (D-Quincy) to bring the legislature back into session. Specifically, the Legislature would need to suspend Rule 12A (the legislative rule that ends the formal legislative session on July 31 of the second year of the two-year session) in order to resume debate over the legislation.

The economic development bill, which includes more than \$1 billion in tax cuts and rebates, plus investments toward local projects and a variety of sectors, was derailed in the last week of the legislative session amidst last-minute concerns over the law known as Chapter 62F.

The law, which was approved by voters in 1986, places a cap on state tax revenue growth and mandates the overage to be returned to individuals who paid income taxes last year. This law would have been triggered for just the second time in state history and would have resulted in more relief than the Legislature projected. Legislative leaders and the Governor's Administration were at odds over whether the trigger should take effect and could not reach a resolution by the end of July 31.



"Working families can't afford to wait for economic relief," said DiZoglio. "Today I was joined by mayors from across the Merrimack Valley and North Shore as we stood in solidarity to call on the Legislature to come back into session and provide struggling families with the relief they need and deserve. In addition to sorely needed tax relief, this legislation includes funding toward important projects in our communities, in the Merrimack Valley and across the Commonwealth, to help bolster the local economy and overall quality of living. We cannot abandon these crucial investments and relief. The Senate and House can and should come together to pass this critical legislation"

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Children of War: An Anthology to Support the Children of Ukraine

WARNING: Some material is disturbing. Some authors have posted a Content Warning before their piece, others do not—and should. I have added some warnings.

FORWARD: I know some readers skip this part of a book, but you should not, especially in this case. It is full of important information and speaks to the reasons many of the authors became involved in this project. Their reasons, and their connections to war, are as important as the pieces they penned.

This anthology contains fourteen different short stories in various genres ranging from literary fiction and memoir to fantasy. Different countries are represented as are different age ranges. Page counts for individual stories also vary.

UNICEF statistics and stats from other experts precedes each work. A photo of each author as a child completes each submission. Some of the works are stand-alone pieces while others are part of larger bodies of work. Most stories have an "Author's Note" and an "About the Author" attached to their piece giving the reader additional information into why they participated in the project and a bit of info on them and their writing. Links are provided to the individual authors so that readers can connect easier with them and their other works. This anthology is a perfect way to discover new authors.

Most of us have had some experience with war, directly through family and friends or indirectly through a neighbor, teacher, local business, etc. War and its subsequent trauma is not discerning, it can and does hit indiscriminately. PTSD is rampant in those who serve in the military actively or are involved in the military through the service of their family members. Can you imagine having to deal with war's horror as a young soul? Through sales this book plans to help the children who will inevitably carry scars of this latest war for the rest of their lives. "Voices of Children Foundation," Ukraine is the charity listed in the book's ACKNOWLEDGEMENT at the end of the book.

Briefly and in order of appearance:

Through Vira's Eyes by MJ Krause-Chivers is a Literary Fiction.

A grandchild of Ukrainian refugees from Russia's civil war, from the first sentence the reader is transported into a realm that one can easily understand. The reader is innocently guided into events that propel the story into horrors. Details such as "the whimpering baby" or a child explaining their need to pee, speak to life's "normalcy" as war shatters what should be a typical day.

Not Dead Just Sleeping by Darrah Steffan is a Fantasy.

Affected by 9/11, flashbacks and inner dialogue give the main character dimension and propel this piece forward. This work speaks to the constant fear surrounding every person experiencing war. It was unclear though if this is part of a larger piece or not.

A Child of Minidoka by Joan T. Seko is a memoir.

This is the only non-fiction piece in this anthology. Her writing details the

three years she spent as a child living in a barbed wired US internment camp during WWII. Her family was Japanese American. To say this first-person account is very powerful is an understatement, its horror is made worse by the fact that it is true and are the memories of an 85-year-old woman.

After reading the above shorts I had put this book down. All well written, the details deeply disturbed me. These above pieces had no warning. (I wish they had.) As a result of subsequent Content Warnings, there were a couple of pieces I did not read.

Jonah by C. Borden is a Fantasy.

Her grandparents lived through WWII. Her mother, born to displaced Germans, remembered the hostility the family underwent living in Poland. This piece is part of the fantasy world, Mythnium, the author has created. This short seeks to explain how trauma, even unconsciously, can affect physical pain. Its powerful material is disturbing. I add my own Content Warning to this piece.

The Prince & the Flute Player by C. Philip is a Historical Fantasy.

The seeds of this are "loosely" derived from a childhood story. Nicely described characters, and settings. "...signs of anxiety and malnourishment were barely hidden under his pure silk garments, his silver ornaments, and his colorful headdress." The fantasy nature of this piece made its warlike story easier to read.

The Tarnished Key by Susan Stradiotto is a Literary Fantasy.

This is the only short that I did not get, it was too cryptic. The main characters wear a plate. Why? Is it a piece of armor? What about the key? What's the treasure in his (maybe the character's a male but I'm not even sure of this) pocket? None of these questions are answered. I reread this twice and still didn't get it. Apologies to the author.

A Mermaid's Tears: A Diary of a War Victim from Angels and Demons by J.C. Seal is a Historical Fantasy.

Her maternal grandfather was in a German then Russian work camp. Time jumps and diary entries effectively move this plot. Along with a few of the other works, this short story continues in her book. The addition of the initialism WTF gives this piece a fresh contemporary slant while in keeping with the fantasy genre. The story travels between current time and Egypt of 524 BCE.

The Dragon's Demise by Daan Katz is a Fantasy. A Content Warning is attached.

Daan's mother acted as a spy playing board games with soldiers to garner and relay info to the author's grandmother. This piece is one of the shorts in his fictional universe. I like the writer's method of telling the tale. The world created is so detailed that it even has its own National Anthem, an attached link is provided for the reader.

I started reading but the events hit too close to home and I had to stop.

A Vampires Heart: A Last Days Novelette by I. Velez is a Fantasy.

I'm assuming that a 12-year-old demon male is not the same as a human of that age otherwise the character does not ring true. I don't know of many 12-year-old males that have two lovemaking sessions in a day. The plot is nonetheless engaging with vivid visuals. One that particularly struck true to me was her description of blood "the metallic aroma flooded his nose ..." A universe emerges that is not only well rounded but also entertaining. The theme: star crossed lovers from rival underworlds.

The Curse of Blood: An Ancient Legends Prequel by L.L. Merewether is a Historical Fiction. A Content Warning is attached.

Ms. Merewether's attention to detail and her well-rounded characters, situated in the past, speak to her award-winning status. Her theme in this piece is the invasion of a stronger people and the suffering they inflict.

Child of Destruction by Astrid V.J. is a Fantasy. This Content Warning explains: "The story looks at the experience of child soldiers ..." Astrid was affected having grown up in South Africa during the end of Apartheid. I read only the last couple pages. The "Author's Note" informs us that the main character's story continues in Warring Lions.

Through The Eyes of a Child by Pamela Floyd is a Literary Fiction.

This piece about the children of Ukraine and war's effects on them are powerfully detailed. Great visuals add to the disturbing piece Ms. Floyd has penned. I add my own Content Warning to this story. As I said, it is very powerful, and disturbing. One section is particularly poignant and timely: "He is a mean old man. Why is he so mean? He sent his army here, but we did nothing to him." Out of the mouth of babes!

The Borrowed Life by Elena Shelest is a Historical Fiction.

Born in Odessa this author uses the history of Cossacks in Ukraine to tell her tale. Though the characters are fictitious they are placed into a real setting and time. Again, nice visuals "...hollow clomping of hooves on the frozen ground and the wind whooshing through the fields." Amidst despair there is hope, and a message, "Live your life as if it was borrowed, so that when the time comes to give it back, you could say that it was put to good use."

Helping, however we can, is why this review was written.

Methuen Police Welcome K-9 "Bohdi" to the Department

Methuen Police Chief Scott J. McNamara and the Methuen Police Department are pleased to announce that Officer Griffin Waller has been selected to train with and be the handler of the department's newest member, K-9 Bohdi.

Bohdi is a two-year-old Belgian Malinois who was purchased with a grant provided by the United State Police Canine Association and the American Kennel Club's Reunite grant program, with matching funds provided by a generous Methuen business.

The grants and matching funds will pay for purchasing Bohdi, and for Bohdi and Officer Waller's initial academy training.

Additionally, Massachusetts Vest-a-Dog has provided a \$6,540 donation to purchase a K-9 kennel insert and heat alert system for a cruiser that will be used by Officer Waller and Bohdi.

Both Bohdi and Officer Waller will attend Patrol K-9 Handler Class at the Boston Police K-9 Academy Patrol Dog School beginning Sept. 12. Once fully trained, Bohdi will serve as a patrol dog, which includes human tracking, evidence recovery, building searches, and aggression control. After completing the Patrol K-9 Handler Class, Officer Waller and Bodhi will have additional opportunities for specialization, such as narcotics detection training and certification.

In the meantime, Bohdi is bonding with Officer Waller, with whom he will live while the two are partners.

Bohdi replaces recently retired Methuen Police Department bloodhound "Duke" and explosive ordinance detection K-9 "Buddy," both of whom served the Department with distinction. Buddy was handled by Officer Tim Getchell. Duke was handled by Sgt. Matt Mueskes and Officer Rob Cubelli.

"I would like to thank the United States Police Canine Association, the American Kennel Club, Massachusetts Vest-a-Dog, and the generous Methuen business that made it possible for us to bring Bohdi onto the department," said Chief McNamara. "I would also like to thank K-9 Duke, K-9 Buddy, and their handlers, Sgt. Matt Mueskes, Officer Rob Cubelli and Officer Tim Getchell for their years of service to the Department. Duke, Buddy and their handlers worked hard to continue showing the value of K-9s to law enforcement and the community."

Tucker appeared on the Paying Attention Podcast before the election saying that he will aggressively prosecute anyone who files a false police report or restraining order. He also committed to releasing mug shots when someone is arrested. The current District Attorney Jon Blodgett has threatened local chiefs with prosecution if they release mug shots of suspects. Tucker will appear on the podcast again at the end of the month.

Former Asst. Chief Probation Officer Sentenced to 17 Years for Sexually Exploiting a Child

Coerced 13-year-old girl to engage in sexually explicit conduct via messaging app

BOSTON – A former Assistant Chief Probation Officer for Lynn District Court was sentenced in federal court today in connection with child exploitation offenses.

Brian Orlandella, 49, of Beverly, was sentenced by U.S. Senior District Court Judge Mark L. Wolf to 17 years in prison and five years of supervised release. Orlandella was also ordered to pay a \$5,000 special assessment to the Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act. On April 20, 2022, Orlandella was convicted following a six-day jury trial of one count of sexual exploitation of a child and one count of transfer of obscene material to a minor.

“Mr. Orlandella took advantage of a vulnerable, 13-year-old girl – he sent sexually explicit material to her and coerced her into producing obscene content through an anonymous social media profile. In his day-to-day life, Mr. Orlandella held himself out to be a trusted member of the law enforcement community, but that couldn’t be farther from the truth,” said United States Attorney Rachael S. Rollins. “The sexual exploitation of children is an offense that will never be tolerated in my office. We are committed to working with our law enforcement partners to prosecute predators and bring treatment, services and justice to our victims.”

“Orlandella knowingly preyed upon a child, sending her explicit videos and directing her to reciprocate. The internet and social media are an integral part of everyday life for our children, and knowing that predators like Orlandella are lurking online is every parent’s worst nightmare. Today’s sentence underlines that the exploitation of children will not be tolerated and that the consequences are serious,” said Matthew B. Millhollin, Special Agent in Charge of Homeland Security Investigations in New England. “HSI is committed to using our unique investigative abilities to search the darkest parts of the internet to find predators like Orlandella and bring them to justice.”

In May 2018, a mother in Texas contacted local police about messages she found on her 13-year-old daughter’s cell phone between her daughter and an adult man, later identified as Orlandella. In the messages, sent via the Kik mobile application, Orlandella sent the victim images of himself masturbating and directed her to send him sexually explicit pictures and videos of herself. The 13-year-old victim told him she was 14 years old, and he acknowledged that he was much older than she was.

The Kik account’s IP address was traced to Orlandella’s residence in Massachusetts. During a search of his residence, two of Orlandella’s phones were seized, one of which contained evidence tying Orlandella to the Kik account that was used to procure sexually explicit imagery from the underage victim. During an on-site interview at his home, Orlandella admitted that he had used Kik and was the person depicted in the obscene videos recovered from the child’s phone.

U.S. Attorney Rollins and HSI SAC Millhollin made the announcement today. Valuable assistance was provided by the Port Neches (Texas) Police Department. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Anne Paruti, Chief of Rollins’ Major Crimes Unit, and Adam W. Deitch, of Rollins’ Public Corruption & Special Prosecutions Unit, prosecuted the case.

This case was brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse, launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice. Led by U.S. Attorneys’ offices and DOJ’s Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state and local resources to locate, apprehend and prosecute individuals who exploit children via the Internet, as well as to identify and rescue victims. “With Malice Toward None”

Abraham Lincoln’s Second Inaugural Address ushered in a humanitarian and charitable tone to the soon-to-be concluded Civil War and its unspeakable horrors. A nation uncertain as to how to acclimate enemy combatants back to the Union witnessed Lincoln’s undeniable plea of forgiveness and mercy for past transgressions. Lincoln clearly set a direction for a still grieving nation recovering from war, which was forever shattered by his assassination.

The poetic beauty and true genius of Lincoln’s speeches involved a combination of directness, clarity, and brevity. Lincoln focused on the need to heal the nation, not to open old wounds. Biden’s recent primetime speech in Philadelphia represented the opposite of Lincoln’s visionary address.

Biden’s own inaugural address called for unity in a time of political violence, chaos, and pandemic. Sadly, Biden reminded me more of Carter’s Malaise Speech, also referred to as A Crisis of Confidence Speech. Carter focused on energy concerns and growing inflation (funny how things change and yet remain the same). In Carter’s speech, there is a real and tangible cry for help--- a genuine sense

of hopelessness and dread about the direction and future of the nation. That desperate and unfocused speech should never come from the President of the United States.

Even during our darkest hours, a President is supposed to guide us toward the light at the end of the tunnel, not through cheap attacks and rash decisions, but mature and long-term leadership.

Is Biden trying to tell us that if only MAGA supporters took their hats and flags home, then all our nation’s problems, even the unforced errors Biden inflicted upon us, will magically disappear? Biden talked incessantly about MAGA extremes and the escalation of violence.

Not that anyone on a certain committee that loves to bump The Bachelor to broadcast their hearings would care to learn, but I maintain a certain scorecard. To my knowledge, it was Antifa and Radical Leftists that occupied entire blocks in major downtown areas, stormed police precincts and drove away the legitimate government for the cities of Portland and Seattle. But a Vietnam Veteran MAGA, who served his country and paid his taxes, is the clear and present danger to our nation?

Reagan and Kennedy both reflected the boundless frontiers and limitless opportunities of a nation that challenged every generation. LAWRENCE, MA - For the first time in the history of the Merrimack Valley Regional Transit Authority (MVRTA), all Lawrence-based bus routes will operate every 30 minutes, all day long, starting September 6, 2022. Historically, MVRTA buses in Lawrence only ran every 30 minutes during peak hours, with hourly service at all other times. For many riders, this proved to be confusing, as they were unsure when buses were running every half hour and when they were running hourly. Keeping a consistent 30-minute service all day long not only makes the schedule easier to understand, it also better reflects the reality that riders need the bus throughout the day and are not likely operating on a banker's 9-5 schedule.

Since July, all service was only running hourly except for routes #1 and #41, due to a national driver shortage. Thanks to an aggressive recruitment campaign and a top salary of \$27.61/hour, MVRTA has been able to overcome the driver shortage and add new operators over the summer who will be deployed in September. Buses will operate every half hour out of the Buckley Transportation Center on Common Street from 5:00 AM until 7:00 PM on weekdays. Saturday service will continue to run hourly from 7:00 AM until 6:00 PM.

With this service improvement, people living, working, or visiting Lawrence, Methuen, Haverhill, Andover, and North Andover will have more flexibility when using public transportation. MVRTA Communications Director Niorka Mendez noted that "Adding more frequency will not only make our system more reliable, it will also improve the rider experience. Riders will no longer need to check the schedule to make sure they don't miss the bus and wait for an hour for the next bus—they will know that the bus will show up every half hour."

Rider Ana Salinas added that "Having the half hour pulse extended for longer hours helps with my time management and makes it that much easier and faster to get around."

In planning this change, MVRTA worked closely with Lawrence Mayor Brian De Peña, who was very enthusiastic about the improved schedule, noting that the more frequent service will be a great benefit for area businesses: "I applaud the decision that MVRTA made to provide a more efficient and faster bus service in our city. This determination will definitely have a positive impact in our community by making our transportation system



even more reliable."

The new schedule is part of a larger campaign to make MVRTA service more responsive to riders' travel needs and be more visible and accessible. Back in March, all MVRTA buses went fare free, resulting in a 71.48% ridership increase. Starting in April, MVRA began optimizing routings, starting with routes 35, 36 and 37, by making routes simpler and more direct. As Administrator Noah Berger observed, "the 37 bus used to literally travel in a figure eight, which

meant that in many instances, you couldn't return to where you initially got on the bus. And since travel times are decreased, we are better respecting our passengers' time." MVRTA will also be introducing bus stop signs and, through a grant from MassDOT's Shared Streets Program, bus shelters, which will remove the intimidation of waiting for a bus. Finally, later this fall, MVRTA will introduce a new colorful bus design and logo that will add to the visibility and attractiveness of riding system. ♦

fund (which has a historic balance of over \$7 billion) to prepare for economic uncertainty.

Funding for Government Upgrades: A roughly \$5.2 billion general government bond bill has been signed into law to fund many of the government's critical infrastructure needs. This funding will modernize state facilities such as our courts, public universities, public safety buildings, and health care centers. The law will also fund successful grant programs that help our cities and towns to address housing, clean water, workforce, and food security needs.

As Chair of the Joint Committee on

Advanced Information Technology, the Internet and Cybersecurity, I am glad that this law also makes investments in cybersecurity and technological upgrades across state government. These investments are increasingly important across all levels of government to improve efficiency and security.

Haverhill Receives \$100K State Grant to Plant 300 More Trees in the City

Haverhill is one of 10 Massachusetts cities and several nonprofit organizations to receive a state grant to plant trees.

The \$100,000 grant to Haverhill is part of the state's Greening the Gateway Cities Program, which relies on trees to reduce runoff flooding and provide a cooling effect in urban neighborhoods where large areas of pavement create significantly more heat.

"Since taking office, we have invested over \$25 million to support the Greening the Gateway Cities Program and have planted nearly 35,000 trees across the Commonwealth, which provide tremendous benefits to our communities, such as improving air quality and lowering energy consumption," said Gov. Charlie Baker.

Along with funding actual trees, the grant also finances "Adopt-a-Tree" information and materials which residents can access to learn more about tree planting and care.

This program is not the first of its kind to be implemented in Haverhill.

In 2019, nearly 500 trees were planted by the Department of Conservation and Recreation as part of a three-year planting effort enacted by Mayor James J. Fiorentini. Of the Greening the Gateway Cities Program, Fiorentini has already made first steps forward.

"Excited and grateful to have received \$100,000 state grant to plant and water approximately 300 new Haverhill trees," Fiorentini wrote Tuesday on social media. "As part of the grant application, we hired a company to find us great locations for the new trees, which we will be planting in the coming weeks."

Groundwork Lawrence also received \$100,000 from the program to plant 100 trees in the South Lawrence West neighborhood and 50 trees at Campagnone North Common. The nonprofit was also awarded \$15,000 to organize door-to-door canvassing, literature mailings and exhibits at community events to raise awareness of tree planting efforts and benefits of trees in urban areas.

The Wall That Heals honors the more than three million Americans who served in the U.S. Armed forces in the Vietnam War and it bears the names of the 58,281 men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in Vietnam.

Lowell Housing Authority Registered Nurse Paula Gouveia

Promoting Health, Wellness, and Financial Stability for Residents

Paula Gouveia an admired and long-term resident of Lowell, serves as the registered public health and wellness nurse employed by the Lowell Housing Authority. Paula explained to Kane that this career was the perfect opportunity to serve her fellow community members and give back to the community she loves. Hired in November, Paula hit the ground running in coordination with the Lowell Health Alliance to determine the top wellness challenges experienced by her residents in affordable and public housing. Paula explained to Kane this information was compiled through a federal wellness survey.

A few of the challenges identified in the survey were isolation especially during the virus, mental health, safety, and housing insecurity due to finances. When Kane met Paula, he knew that she was a networker. Paula brings resources directly to the residents to promo. a healthy body, mind, financial security and a healthy home. The Lowell Housing Authority writes grants to runs self- Sufficiency programs, networks with the community mental health agencies, primary care doctors and the police department to create a safe environment for residents, and families to find the resources needed to move towards health and financial stability. Paula said, " "You can't put the puzzle together, with missing pieces:"

Kane likes how Paula looks at the whole person and supports them in finding the resources they need. Paula explained to Kane that anyone can fall into hard times and affordable housing options allow residents an opportunity to live in a housing community while working towards greater independence or for the elderly and disabled clients a supportive affordable living community. Paula explained that her residents may be families that lost their primary bread winner, people who lost their income, people who became sick, combat veterans acclimating to the civilian world, survivors of domestic violence, and working families with children affected by inflation and the high cost of everything. Paula's says, "I love my job, I can't believe they pay me to give back to the people in my community."

Kane knows a lot of nurses, but Paula is the only nurse he knows that works in Community Public Health. Paula explained that she has worked for 33 years as a nurse in the operating room and wound care. She was grateful for the experience but her current position is also a very rewarding and a perfect match. By cultivating relationships with the residents, she is able to build trust and help build bridges for the residents to support each other and connect them to the resources the community has to offer. Paula explained to Kane she builds trust by hosting lunches, offering

social events like Bingo and being present in the housing developments so she is seen regularly. Kane thought wow he likes to have lunch. His humans only give him breakfast and dinner.

These types of social events allow people to meet each other to help with isolation and community building. Paula feels she has made many inroads in being a trusted member of the community. Residents often call for health and wellness advice. Although she does not officially work as a medical nurse, she does provide comfort and provide clinical information to emergency responders at a housing development call.

Paula also feels connected and grateful for the Housing Authority Community that supports her. The Lowell Housing Authority Administration is very dedicated to Resident health and well- being. Paula hosted a teen health fair this month that Kane attended. At this event he met both the Executive Director Dr. Gary Wallace and Assistant Executive Director Adam Garvey. The staff is supportive of each other and very hands on. During our interview Paula contacted Assistant Executive Director Adam Garvey to discuss the recent purchase of a downtown Lowell Building for Veterans Housing. As Paula said 'we love our veterans!' She said the staff is very eager to start this project and an



additional project for future veterans housing.



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

Illegal Alien Jefri Paulino of Lawrence Sentenced for Fentanyl Trafficking, Illegal Reentry into the U.S.

Defendant previously convicted of fentanyl trafficking in 2017

BOSTON – A Dominican man residing in Lawrence has been sentenced for fentanyl trafficking and illegal reentry into the United States after being deported.

Jefri Paulino, 26, was sentenced by U.S. District Court Chief Judge F. Dennis Saylor IV on Aug. 31, 2022 to 10 years in prison and five years of supervised release. On Oct. 22, 2021, Paulino pleaded guilty to one count of possession with intent to distribute 400 grams or more of fentanyl and cocaine and one count of unlawful reentry of a deported alien. Paulino has been in federal custody since his arrest in September 2020.

In September 2020, Paulino agreed to sell a confidential informant approximately one kilogram of fentanyl and 50 grams of cocaine at a restaurant in

Haverhill. Paulino was arrested upon his arrival for the drug deal and was found in possession of individual plastic bags that contained approximately one kilogram of fentanyl and 50 grams of cocaine.

Paulino was previously convicted of fentanyl trafficking in 2017 for which he was sentenced to three years in prison and was deported in November 2018.

United States Attorney Rachael S. Rollins and Brian D. Boyle, Special Agent in Charge of the Drug Enforcement Administration's New England Field Office made the announcement. Valuable assistance was provided by the Massachusetts State Police. Assistant U.S. Attorney Stephen W. Hassink of Rollins' Narcotics & Money Laundering Unit prosecuted the case.

The End of Summer

Welcome to September which will bring the season of fall in mid-month. It seems each summer goes by faster and faster. September can still bring some warm days with temperatures in the 80s and it's not impossible to reach 90 or low 90s.

Even though September is here you can still get summer weather. As a result, you can still wear tee shirts and shorts in September. During September we lose over an hour of daylight. This will cause the days to continue to get shorter and the nights will become longer. With the longer nights can come cooler overnight temperatures. During the first half of September the ocean temperatures are still relatively warm so on a warm day you can still make a trip to the beach and make it a beach day.

The beaches will be less crowded and if you go swimming at the beach this month use caution as there are no more lifeguards after Labor Day. Try and go to the beach with someone you know. This is a smart decision with no lifeguards on the beach.

Recapping August it was another hot month, great for going to the beach. There were many days when the high temperature reached 90 degrees or higher. August turned out to be somewhat wetter than July though the rain that fell in August was not enough to eliminate the drought.

The Merrimack Valley did not do as well for rain in August compared to areas south of Boston especially southeast Massachusetts as well as portions of Southern New Hampshire. During the second half of August there was a day with heavy rain that caused flooding on roadways south of Boston including East Providence. In Rehoboth, MA 7 inches of rain fell. Attleboro MA got over 6 inches of rain. Due to the dry ground not all of this rain was absorbed by the ground. As a result there was a lot of runoffs from this rain which caused flooding on roadways.

This amount of rain improved drought conditions in Southeast MA including coastal Plymouth County. However, this rain did not eliminate the drought

over Southeast MA. This goes to show us that during the summertime not all areas get the same amount of rain. When this heavy rain occurred south of Boston the Merrimack Valley got very little rain. As a result, the extreme drought continued for areas north & west of Boston.

During a winter storm the rain/snow amounts from a storm cover more widespread areas. Due to the drought and lack of rain this summer some towns put out water bans. No outdoor watering. Water had to be conserved due to the lack of rain in many areas this summer. What would it take to eliminate the drought entirely?

Moisture rain from a remnant hurricane or tropical storm would be a large help. Remnant rain from a tropical system can produce several inches and it's even possible for double digit amounts. Time will tell if this occurs.

Recapping this summer 2022, it was the 2nd hottest summer on record for Boston. It was also the 4th driest summer on record for Boston with only 4.42 inches of rain. The data for these records includes the months of June, July, and August. These three months are Meteorological summer. After a slow start to summer with some cool days in June summer weather came in fast in July. The high-pressure system in the Northern Atlantic that gave us a cool June with the jet stream tracking to our south weakened (broke down) allowing the hot weather over the central US to be able to move east into our area. The jet stream retreated back north into Canada along with the Bermuda High Pressure system off the east coast to become stronger all leading to our hot & humid weather. This weather pattern continued for most of August.

The tropics were quiet for August. Will the tropics become active in September?? Will we see more hot weather in September? Will we get some beneficial rain in September? Stay tuned to next month's article for these answers!



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Myths

Periodontal Disease

Greetings all.
Exposing myths and misinformation is a very sensitive topic, because old information is so well entrenched in us that it is hard to remove. Many advices in the past were based on opinions and not on scientific proofs. I understand that conflicting opinions are confusing and there are many of them. In the end, we are the judges and decide for ourselves what to believe. If you see contradictions in this writeup, please look up reliable online sources.

Myths 1: Drink plenty of water and get plenty of rest.

This is a myth. Diluting our blood is not useful for any condition and can be dangerous. Drinking tons of water does not help cure the flu nor help us lose weight. The advice should be “stay well hydrated”, which means going to urinate 5 to 7 times a day. We lose one percent of bone and muscle strength per year (more or less). We lose this same amount every day if we rest too much. The advice should be “relative rest “. When we are sick, we should still get up from time to time to walk for a minute, sit for meals, sit to watch TV. Bed rest or immobility does not cure anything.

Myths 2: Exercise, like running, is bad for arthritis.

The truth is that marathon runners get much less knee arthritis than sedentary people. The prevention and treatment of arthritis is strengthening the muscles - of course, within reason.

Myths 3: Vitamins.

The best and probably best way to get these important micronutrients, is the way they are packaged by nature - in food. Very many real studies have shown them useless in the form of supplements for the average person.

Myths 4: Not wearing corrective eyeglasses can damage the eyes.

The truth is that your vision will not be as good if you do not wear the eyeglasses that you need.

Not wearing them will not make things worse. Maybe the opposite is true. We keep showing that a little stress strengthens the body. Of course, this does not mean to go ahead and torture your eyes. Similarly, occasional hard to chew foods is best for teeth...

In general, we should not play with nature without respecting our adaptation to life over hundred thousand of years. Sudden artificial changes to make our life physically easier may not be healthy. We need to use our bodies, we need to lift somewhat heavy objects, we need to fast at times, etc. Some stress is necessary for good health.

Intense enemy ground fire prevented three attempts at extraction. On the third attempt, they were shot down and crashed in the jungle. Steve’s company sized unit had to walk out of the area, while under fire. They carried the wounded and fourteen killed in action with them, taking two and a half days to link up with another unit of the 1st Cavalry sent out to assist them. During this movement, the unit was under intense enemy attack. The Company was short one Medic. Specialist Bird was the only wounded Soldier that was able to walk and continued rendering aid to the wounded as they moved. On the second day of the march, while linking up with the additional Company sent to support them, Specialist Bird was wounded again by enemy RPG fire. Finally, late in the day on July 26, 1968, another Medevac Helicopter was able to extract Steve and other wounded Soldiers. After surgery at the 18th Surgical Hospital in Quang Tri, Steve had a brief visit with Chief Warrant Officer Jacobs who was awaiting transport to Camp Zama, Japan for additional surgery on the wounds he received for his actions on July 24, 1968. Helicopter pilot, Chief Warrant Officer Art Jacobs was awarded the Silver Star, Purple Heart, and Distinguished Flying Cross for his actions that day. Steve was awarded the Purple Heart and Bronze Star with V Device for valor in combat. To this day, Steve remains in awe of what he watched the Airmobile Infantry Soldiers, he had the honor of serving with, and what the Soldiers accomplished daily. His Company maintains a website at www.eagerarms.com. It is an excellent site for anyone wanting to know what it was really like to be an Infantry Soldier in Vietnam.

During his year in Vietnam, he earned a coveted “Combat Medical Badge,” an Air Medal, two Bronze Stars and Two

Purple Hearts, (despite being wounded three times), along with several other decorations. After his tour in Vietnam ended, Steve finished his two years in the US Army at Fort Bless, Texas. Returning to the Merrimack Valley, he earned his bachelor and master’s degree from Suffolk University on the GI Bill, while working at Western Electric in North Andover, Massachusetts and raising a family at the same time. He is married to Marianne, they have a son and a daughter, and three grandchildren, two boys and a girl. Working mostly at Western Electric, he also supported his family with stints at Vernon Plastics, Pynn Companies, and even working as a substitute teacher after retiring from Weir Valves and Controls in 2010. Steve Bird is truly a “Hero in Our Midst.”

Military Veteran Group Says Student Loan Forgiveness is a Disservice to Those who Served

Mission Roll Call survey finds close to 80% of veterans opposed to student loan forgiveness. - Pinkston News Service

WASHINGTON, DC—(Pinkston News Service)—Calling it “responsible and fair,” President Joe Biden recently unveiled the administration’s expected \$500 billion Student Loan Debt Relief Plan, which, in his words, is necessary to “fix a badly broken system.” As Americans continue to voice strong opinions in the wake of the announcement, the head of one national veterans organization believes Biden’s plan does a huge disservice to active duty service members and veterans alike.

Marine Corps veteran Cole Lyle, who heads the nonpartisan organization Mission Roll Call, argues that many men and women who joined the military did so to not only defend their country in a time of war, but to benefit from a debt-free college education through the GI bill. And, their sacrifices should not be diminished.

“I used the GI Bill to go to school. I was self-aware enough out of high school to know that I wasn’t ready for college, and if I eventually wanted to go back to school, I would have that benefit,” said Lyle in a recent interview on FOX News Channel. “I signed with that implicit understanding that I would have that. I utilized it.”

Lyle, who served in Afghanistan, also pointed out that the administration’s justification for its student loan forgiveness plan was based on a federal law which he says “was explicitly

designed for members of the military who were volunteering to sacrifice their lives after 9/11.”

The primary intent of the 2003 Higher Education Relief Opportunities For Students (HEROES) Act was to provide federal student loan relief for active duty personnel and National Guard members serving in a time of war, military operation or national emergency.

Lyle’s view also reflects that of other veterans. A poll conducted by his organization earlier this year found that more than 6,000 veterans (77%) are opposed to student loan forgiveness. And for that reason, Lyle was disappointed that they were shut out of the debate.

“We really weren’t seeing that perspective anywhere in the national debate surrounding this and I thought it was important to include,” Lyle told FOX News.

In an opinion piece published in May, Lyle added: “It was certainly the right of those who chose not to serve to find different [financing] options, but it should not be at the literal and figurative expense of those who served our nation.”

According to a recent CNBC survey, almost 60% of U.S. adults are concerned Biden’s plan will worsen inflation. Other surveys show a more mixed reaction. As for what’s next, it has been widely reported Biden’s plan could face legal challenges.



DiZoglio Triumphs Over Democratic Establishment, Wins Party Primary for State Auditor

State Sen. Diana DiZoglio beat back establishment Democrats Tuesday, winning the primary for state auditor against former Assistant Transportation Secretary Chris Dempsey.

At the time of this report, with about 75% of the state's precincts reporting, DiZoglio was winning by about 40,000 votes statewide.

"Our campaign began way back in June of last year, built on a foundation of opening up state government to everyone—no matter our background, bank balance or zip code—and it's been the guiding light of this journey. I'm so incredibly grateful to all the people we met with, learned from and worked

alongside," DiZoglio said.

DiZoglio, who will face off against Republican Anthony Amore in November, went on to victory despite losing the party's endorsement at its spring convention and being dissed by her boss, Senate President Karen E. Spilka; immediate predecessor in the Senate, Kathleen O'Connor-Ives; and the woman she hopes to succeed, state Auditor Suzanne M. Bump.

DiZoglio celebrated her upset victory with supporters at Stacks in downtown Haverhill.

In a statement, Amore congratulated DiZoglio on, what he called, her "hard fought victory." He said, however, he has the endorsement of Gov. Charlie Baker.

Grand Jury Indicts Man in 36-Year Cold Case Murder of North Andover Woman

A 62-year-old man, already in prison for a 2008 conviction, was indicted Wednesday and charged with the strangling death of a 20-year-old North Andover woman in June 1986.

Essex County District Attorney Jonathan W. Blodgett said an Essex County Grand Jury indicted John Carey, who turns 63 on Sept. 3, after hearing evidence in the 36-year-old cold case. Claire Gravel, a Salem State College student, was found dead Sunday, June 30, 1986 after having gone the night before to Major Magleashes' Pub on Washington Street in Salem with members of her softball team.

"For 36 years, Claire Gravel's family and friends have had nothing but questions about her death," Blodgett said. "Today, we are able to give them some of the answers."

Blodgett said a 2012 lead based on surviving physical evidence was

investigated using modern forensic testing. Since then, the efforts of assistant district attorneys and State Police detectives specializing in cold cases, carried on the investigation that was started by Beverly, Salem and State Police at the time of the murder.

Gravel was last seen alive between 1:30 and 1:45 a.m. that morning after being dropped off at her apartment on Loring Avenue in Salem. Three workmen discovered her body in the woods on the northbound side of Route 128 in Beverly. The medical examiner determined she had been strangled to death.

Over the years, Blodgett's office said, investigators interviewed dozens of witnesses and persons-of-interest and followed through on every lead and tip they received.

Carey is currently serving time at MCI Concord for a 2008 conviction on a charge of attempted murder.

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Women Are Disproportionately Hurting Our Country

When I was in college, I read a book by George Gilder, one of the wisest thinkers of the last half-century, titled "Naked Nomads," which had a deep impact on me. It was about single men and all the pathologies associated with them. For example, Gilder drove home the point that the biggest factor concerning violent crime was that it is overwhelmingly committed by single men.

While there was no danger — I would say no chance — that I would commit a violent crime (though I was, at the time, single), this fact along with others in the book made me a lifelong advocate of marriage.

I also came to realize that raising good men was the most important thing society could do. If it doesn't, the male propensity to physical aggression and predatory sexual behavior will wreak havoc. Therefore, raising boys to control their natures is fundamental to society avoiding chaos.

Over the course of a lifetime, however, I have come to realize that while society was right about males, it was wrong about females. Whether spoken or unspoken, most people thought that girls just didn't need to be raised to control their natures nearly as much as boys did.

But they do.

It's true that females are not inclined to violence or predatory sexual behavior as men are. But this hardly means that girls and women don't have to learn to control their natures. On the contrary, as I have been telling parents for many years now, they need to teach their daughters to control their natures just as much as they teach their sons to do so.

Specifically, girls have to learn to control their emotions.

Just as the male sexual drive and violent impulses can overwhelm their conscience and their ability to think and act rationally, emotions can do the same thing in girls and women: overwhelm their conscience and their ability to think and act rationally.

However, it should be obvious that at least two generations of parents — especially among the well-educated — did not teach many of their daughters to control their emotions and think rationally.

The result is that women are disproportionately active in doing damage to our society.

The most obvious example is education. American schools teach less and indoctrinate more than ever before. Big-city public (and most private) schools are damaging young Americans to an extent and in ways no one imagined just a few years ago. Young children are prematurely sexualized — they are, for example, exposed to "Drag Queen Story Hour" in class and in local libraries from the age of 5. These feature a man dressed as a woman reading and dancing for them.

And who is facilitating all of this? In virtually every case, a woman. Ninety-two percent of kindergarten teachers are women, 75% of all teachers are women and 85% of librarians are women.

And they are teaching young people to despise their country (the creator of the poisonous "1619 Project" is a woman), to feel guilty about their "white privilege" or to think of themselves as victims if they are black. Even worse, they are indoctrinating them in "nonbinary" thinking regarding sex and gender.

As City Journal reports, "Los Angeles Unified School District has adopted a radical gender-theory curriculum encouraging teachers to work toward the 'breakdown of the gender binary,' to experiment with gender pronouns such as 'they,' 'ze,' and 'tree,' and to adopt 'trans-affirming' programming to make their classrooms 'queer all school year.'"

The same is happening in school districts around the country.

These ideas originated in university gender studies and women's studies departments, nearly all of whose professors are female.

Teachers and their unions did great damage to young people during COVID-19. They demanded — because of their hypochondria and an apparent inability to apply reason to COVID-19 risk — that schools be closed for nearly two years. Teachers unions in big cities threatened to go on strike if schools opened. In general, teachers unions are just radical arms of the Democratic Party and the progressive movement. They are overwhelmingly composed of women members and women leaders. The head of the National Education Association is a woman, as are the heads of the Los Angeles, Chicago and New York City teachers unions.

Chicago, 1996. Drug trafficker Jimmy Keene (Taran Egerton) faces a ten-year prison sentence. Then the FBI approach him with a strange offer: transfer to a maximum-security prison for the "criminally insane," gather evidence to finally quash the appeal of suspected serial killer Larry Hall (Paul Walter Hauser), and Jimmy can earn his freedom.

That's the story behind Apple TV+'s riveting true crime limited series 'Black Bird.' The too-wild-to-be-fiction premise comes straight from the real James Keene's 2010 autobiography, 'In With the Devil: A Fallen Hero, a Serial Killer, and a Dangerous Bargain for Redemption.'

The catch with the deal Keene is offered, is that it requires him to be transferred from a minimum-security prison to a high-security prison for dangerous and unstable inmates. It's not a good environment for anyone, especially Keene since he is the son of a cop. Moreover, in order to keep a lid on it, no one in the maximum-security prison is to know that Keene is working with the feds (played by Greg Kinnear and Sepideh Moafi), who are concurrently trying to find the bodies of Hall's victims.

Unfortunately, Jimmy's ex-cop dad (Ray Liotta, in one of his last screen roles) blows his cover before morning tea. With crooked guards and a mob boss prisoner not missing a thing, the chances of Jimmy surviving, let alone succeeding, become increasingly slim. The best scenes are the cat-and-mouse exchanges between Keene and Hall, verbally dancing around each other to see who may break first.

'Black Bird' is loaded with stellar performances, starting with newcomer Laney Stiebing's haunting turn as Jessica. Greg Kinnear is terrific as the small-town detective who trusts his gut and out-thinks the Feds, and Sepideh Moafi is magnetic as Lauren, the FBI

agent who can see through Jimmy's charms.

Ray Liotta, who died in June, stands out as Jimmy's dad, an ex-cop who blames himself for his son going bad. Liotta's gritty Jim Keene Sr. crumbles, emotionally and eventually physically, wondering if ever did enough for his boy.

Egerton turns in his most mature performance yet, complex and wrenching. Criminally overlooked for playing Elton John in 'Rocketman' a couple of years ago, he's finally getting his due in this role.

Paul Walter Hauser is simply mesmerizing in his role as Larry Hall. Hauser plays him as a deeply creepy figure who is nonetheless rendered incredibly human. His menacing and haunting performance won't ever be forgotten and ranks among the great on-screen serial killer portrayals.

'Black Bird' is written by Dennis Lehane, author of *Gone Baby Gone*, *Mystic River*, and *Shutter Island*, so it is perhaps no surprise of the show's quality, but it is Lehane's first time as a showrunner and he has shown an instant understanding of the genre.

'Black Bird' is the type of expertly written and crafted drama that makes it nearly impossible to point to any one section of the six-hour story and declare it the reason the show is so good. It feels singular moment to moment, yes, but it also has an impressively strong overall impact. In the end, it does something remarkably simple, something that true crime stories too often fail to do. "Black Bird" tells a great story and tells it well.

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YE GAY O'LE VALLEY: Man in the Mirror I Will Not Become Them

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At the start of the summer, I decided to begin a social experiment for this column. I'm 58 and have been out of the closet for almost 30 years. I have heard every homophobic and stereotypical remark, accusation, or false pieces of information about the LGBTQIA community there is. I have told countless people how it makes me, and other members of this community feel and the danger it puts us in. We've explained how these words give license to more homophobic rhetoric, homophobic abuse/hate crimes and death. We've screamed it from the top of our lungs to stop and yet some people don't. We are met with comment like, "Give me a @#\$%ing break," or "WHAAA I'M ABUSED BY THE TRUTH. WHAAA I'M A VICTIM." Both statements were made to me in an email from the owner of this paper when I told him that his comment on how he found my column on Women's Health Rights "hilarious" was hurtful and abusive. He also told me that he, "Hates everything I stand for." So, I decided to use the same words and anger toward a certain demographic to see what their reaction would be.

To see what would happen if the tables were turned, I began writing and posting

very inflammatory and false statements about straight, white men. My community members have been referred to as pedophiles so, I referenced white, straight men to rapists. Lesbians, I've heard, hate children. I said that men loved their guns more than their children. I stated that they all want women in the kitchen and pregnant and alluded that they wanted the LGBTQIA community exterminated and that if we allow them to continue with their agenda, they will destroy America. It's much like being told that we have a secret "gay agenda" and we're grooming children to be gay to take over America. If we are sex crazed abhorractions, men must be sex crazed misogynists. I particularly like, "Being gay is a choice." Okay then, be gay. Be gay right now. The reaction from those who did and didn't know me was swift and fierce yet, nobody saw the hypocrisy.

People who have known me for years and decades thought these were my true feelings. Words have power. Actions seem to have little. We saw this on January 6 when words caused an insurrection but some refuse to acknowledge the impact of each. The gaslighting and fear that many on the right exercise, would be laughable if it wasn't so hysterically insane and destructive to individual liberty and the "American way."

Men have enslaved, raped, beaten, traveled to foreign lands, and engaged in massive human trafficking, slaughtered endless cultures under the guise of, "life and liberty and God's will." workers are at the vanguard of ruining young people's lives at children's hospitals that push giving young people puberty-blocking hormones and opposite-gender hormones, performing hysterectomies and mastectomies on healthy girls who say they are boys, and chemically or physically castrating healthy boys who say they are girls.

Women are at the vanguard of perverting the medical profession by advocating the teaching of woke ideologies in medical schools, placing these ideologies on an equal footing with medical education.

Last week an organization called Physicians for Reproductive Health published an open letter to the nation's reporters and news editors, demanding they censor anti-abortion activists: "We are asking for a commitment from the community of media outlets reporting on abortion to keep in mind the true danger that you present when interviewing anti-abortion extremists. You are giving the opportunity for dangerous lies to spread."

As regards the demand that news outlets censor pro-life individuals and

groups, the open letter was signed by more than 600 medical doctors and other health care professionals. Nearly every signatory was a woman. And all four of the listed leaders of Physicians for Reproductive Health are women.

Women clergy have been at the vanguard of pushing Christianity and Judaism to the left, leaving mainstream churches and synagogues increasingly empty. Of course, the increasingly feminized male clergy go along with their female colleagues.

And women are disproportionately supportive of cancel culture, the greatest threat to free speech in American history.

It should go without saying, but it's undoubtedly necessary to note that there are many women doing great, even heroic, things for our society, and that many men are working to wreck it. But for those who associate women with instinctively protecting children or with being supportive of a traditionally religious life, this era in American history has provided something of a shock.
