Four schools of the town are now "Standard" and the other three could be made so without very great expense. It would be well to take advantage of state aid in this particular.

The hearty co-operation of school directors, citizens and teachers is largely responsible for the present status of these institutions.

The educational progress in Clarendon is substantial and I appreciate the faithful efforts of all concerned for the general welfare of the children.
